Speaker Program: Craft Talk from Doris Gentry

Once again we were awakened to the gift of "gratitude" as Doris shared with the group her difficult and painful childhood as a Foster Child suffering physical abuse while moving from one home to the next. Suffering multiple injuries including broken bones and brain surgery at age 21, Doris related a life of growing up with few signs of love and even less of support as she attempted to make sense of the world from a cruel and damaging home environment.

Doris was able to pull the lemonade from the lemons of her life when she realized that "when crap happens, we make a choice". Will that choice be to allow wrong behavior to be repeated or will the choice be to "break the mold" and create a new me defined by the positive choices I chose to make.

Asking each of us to remember one teacher or mentor from our early childhood that made a difference in our lives, Doris challenged us to know that Napa Kids need each of us to be that positive role model that can make a life changing impact on their growth and development. Directly as parents, grandparents, neighbors or friends or indirectly through Rotarian support of Interact and the Boys and Girls Club we have that chance to offer that element of support which was clearly not available to Doris in her troubled youth.

To answer this challenge of supporting our young people Doris was able to draw on her 20 years of teaching parenting classes at Napa Valley College and her over 20 years as a Foster parent to over 100 teenage boys. From these activities and her other life experiences Doris gave us her 4 favorite parenting tips.

Tip #1) Learn the Ages of Influence for Kids. Years 0-5 is the tactile phase of growth with the focus on touch, taste, run and play. Their first opportunity to explore the immediate universe as they discover their own body skills and limitations. Phase 5-9 years kids are taking everything in like sponges and expanding their horizons of interest. Much like a puzzle not yet complete they are sensing and experiencing the world around them but not able to make sense of how things work as they are learning but not yet really thinking for themselves. Doris then sited the age phase through 9 and 10 years as the kids now begin to connect the dots "logic is ruling their minds and you begin to see the deep analyzing of things". Knowing the ages of influence helps us to better connect.

Tip #2) You matter and you are making a difference in the life of a child. Doris reminded us that we can still remember the name of that teacher or person that impacted our lives some 40 years later. Don't think that

just because you have a limited amount of time with a child that you are not making an impact. Even as a neighbor, friend, aunt or uncle you have every opportunity by your "actions, words and encouragement" to make an impact that lasts a lifetime.

Tip #3) Technology sucks the life from our kids. The feared reality has now been documented that children today spend over 7 hours a day looking at some form of screen device. Kids need to be still to think, read or just daydream as they explore a world filled with possibility. Doris encouraged getting outside and looking at the sky and birds as a far more stimulating, expanding and connective than burying noses in a laptop or going to see a movie.

Tip #4) Remember that a soft voice calls people to you, share your views but use your library voice. Reminding everyone that kids do as you do and not as you say, it is important that your actions are in alignment with the words you are saying to them and in their presence. As well, a louder voice does not enhance communication; when you are gracious and fair with them they will rise or fall to the level of their environment.

After sharing her 4 tips of communicating with children, Doris thanked all Rotarians for all they do in supporting and relating to the young people in our community. Her sharing the detail of her difficult childhood and what she has accomplished by turning her life around to the point where she can now help others to not have to experience the pain and fear as she did in her early formative years. There was a warm ovation thanking Doris for heartfelt sharing of her past and a present where she continues to offer a home to those who have none.

Concluding Breakfast: President Hugh gave Bob thanked Doris for her talk and sent everyone out for a very successful week in our beautiful Napa Valley.
