Medical Education to Make a Difference in Western Kentucky

The University of Kentucky's College of Medicine has taken a big step toward solving the issues of medical care in rural and underserved areas in the region. Their relatively new Western Kentucky Initiative puts medical students at three hubs, including Paducah, in hopes that after several months of studying and shadowing local physicians, they will return here to practice after graduation.

Dr. Carol Hustedde, the Director of Community Medicine for UK illustrated how many pockets of low care exists in western Kentucky. For example, Ballard County has no physicians and only one Nurse Practitioner to serve residents. In Trigg County, she said there is one physician for every

14,000 residents. McCracken fares better with a ratio of one to 1,214.

Dr. Hustedde said history has proven medical students end up practicing where they trained, which is the important component behind training these third year medical students in Paducah, Owensboro and Bowling Green. During the their five months at one of the hubs students rotate with local physicians in their offices, or at local hospitals, through all the disciplines. In addition, the students are able to electronically attend courses at the main UK campus over the internet.

The students are required to connect with the community, such as participating in Paducah's new Health Park initiative. Dr. Hustedde said the new park is an important free resource for the local medical community for the overall well-being of patients, which may be dealing with chronic illness or wellness issues. The ultimate goal is to recruit more western Kentucky students into the program.
