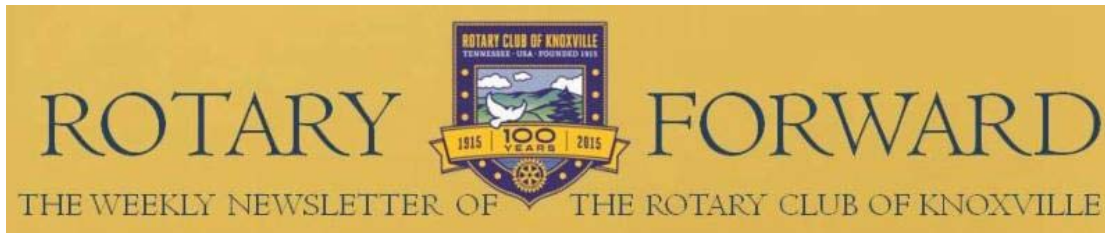

January 26, 2016 Program



David B. Rausch, Police Chief

Chief Rausch has been with the Knoxville Police Department since January 1993. He served in the Patrol Division for the majority of his tenure as a police officer in various roles. His only assignment outside of patrol was a temporary assignment to assist the Training Division to instruct and mentor the Basic Police Recruit Class in 1995. He has served as the Commanding Officer for the Patrol Division and for each of the Patrol Division Districts, as well as the Staff Officer for the Deputy Chief of Patrol. He has promoted through the ranks from Officer to Sergeant in 1998, Sergeant to Lieutenant in 2002, Lieutenant to Captain in 2006, Captain to Deputy Chief in 2009, and to Chief of Police in 2011.

Chief Rausch came to Knoxville from Louisville, Kentucky where he graduated in 1986 from the University of Louisville with a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science. He then enlisted in the U.S. Army and served in the Military Police Corps from 1986 to 1990. While in the Military he served with the 555th M.P. Company at Ft. Lee, Virginia and with A Company 3rd Battalion of the United States Army Correctional Brigade at Ft. Riley, Kansas. He earned three Army Achievement Medals, an Army Commendation Medal, a Good Conduct Medal, named the Distinguished Graduate from his Corrections Non-Commissioned Officers Course, and attained the Rank of Sergeant prior to the end of his enlistment.

Chief Rausch is a graduate of the 105th Administrative Officers Course at the Southern Police Institute and received his Master of Science in Justice Administration from the University of Louisville in 2001. He is also a graduate of the Federal Bureau of Investigations 218th National Academy Class in Quantico, Virginia in 2004, the FBI Tennessee Law Enforcement Executive Development Seminar in Pigeon Force, Tennessee in 2008, the Police Executive Research Forum 40th Session of the Senior Management Institute for Police in Boston, Massachusetts in 2008, the FBI Leadership in Counter Terrorism Course Atlantic Section 2011-2012 in Edinburgh, Scotland, Belfast, Northern Ireland, Quantico, Virginia, and Halifax, Nova Scotia, the 40th Session of the FBI National Executive Institute in Quantico, Virginia in 2013, and the U.S. Secret Service Dignitary Protection Seminar in Washington, DC in 2014.

He has taught law enforcement and civilian personnel throughout the Southeast and the Eastern Coast on the United States and serves on the teaching staff of the University of Tennessee Law Enforcement Innovation Center (LEIC). He is an Adjunct Faculty Member of South College Legal Studies and Criminal Justice Program in Knoxville, and an Adjunct Faculty Member of Bethel University College of Professional Studies.

Chief Rausch served on the Knoxville Police Department Special Operations Squad (SWAT Team) from 1997 to 2007.

Chief Rausch is a member of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, the Tennessee Association of Chiefs of Police, the Police Executive Research Forum, the FBI National Academy Associates, the International Law Enforcement Educators and Trainer's Association (Charter Member), the Police Benevolent Association, and the Fraternal Order of Police.

Chief Rausch is involved with numerous organizations in the Knoxville community. He was a member of the Committee that developed the Ten Year Plan to End Chronic Homelessness in Knoxville and Knox County and served on the Advisory Board during the implementation of the plan. He currently serves on the Board of Directors for the Mental Health Association of East Tennessee, the Family Justice Center Board, the Boys and Girls Clubs of the Tennessee Valley Corporate Board, the Knoxville Knox County E-911 Emergency Communications District Board, the UT Institute for Public Service LEIC Board, the Metropolitan Drug Commission Board, the South College Criminal Justice Community Advisory Board, the Junior League of Knoxville Community Advisory Board, the Knoxville Public Safety Foundation Board, the Trinity Foundation Board, the Appalachian High Intensity Drug Areas Board, the Volunteer Ministry Board, is the Second Vice Chair of the Midsize Cities Section of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, and is the President of the Tennessee Association of Chiefs of Police.

Program Recap - January 19, 2016



RCK President **Sandy Martin** introduced RCK President-Elect **Allen Pannell**. He put before the club the service strategy that came out of the visioning process from last year: each year the club will vote on a service project that incorporates funding (both local and Rotary International) and volunteer service hours. Four service

projects for the Rotary Year 2016-17 are up for the club's consideration (each involving \$10,000 in funding)

1. Beaumont Elementary School (presented by RCK member **Emma Webb**): Continuing the relationship the club has with Beaumont, this project would connect with art education as a way to build confidence and self-esteem among some of the more challenged students. The specific art project is a mandala. Funds would be used to hire an "artist-in-resident." Volunteer service opportunities would involve after-school mentoring and hanging the mandalas in the office area of the school.
2. Great Smoky National Park (presented by RCK member **Sandy Martin**): Continuing in the long-time relationship to the park (going all the way back to Col. David Chapman, the first RCK president and a driving force in the establishment of the park), this project would refurbish the amphitheater at Elkmont. Plans and materials have been developed by the park service; additional funding would come from the Friends of the Great Smoky National Park. This project would go well with the 100th anniversary of the founding of the National Park Service.
3. Remote Area Medical (RAM) (presented by RCK member **Rob Chadwell**): RAM does medical and dental work all over the world, but has a particular focus on Appalachia. Our volunteer service would take place in February of 2017 at Chilhowee Park, where up to 1,000 people will be served over a two-day period.
4. Second Harvest (presented by RCK member **Elaine Streno**): Second Harvest, out of its warehouse in Blount County, sponsors 6 feeding programs in 18 counties of East Tennessee. One of their signature programs is "Food for Kids"-providing food for 11,000 children in 249 schools across the region. The volunteer service component will be helping with the packing of food backpacks. Teachers identify children who need food over the weekend; children receive a backpack to take home. Repeated studies have

Weekly Polio Update

Polio Headlines:

There are three months to go until the synchronized switch from the trivalent to bivalent oral polio vaccine, an important milestone in achieving a polio-free world.



Afghanistan: No new wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) cases were reported in the past week. The most recent case had an onset of paralysis in Kunar on 19 November. The total number of WPV1 cases for 2015 remains 19, compared to 28 reported in the country in 2014.

Pakistan: One new wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) case was reported in the past week, with onset of paralysis on 22 December 2015 in Peshawar. The total number of WPV1 cases for 2015 is now 53, compared to 303 reported in 2014 by this time last year. A total of 306 cases occurred in Pakistan in 2014.

In addition to the trail, the KBGA also recently received a donation of outdoor exercise equipment (e.g., pull-up bars), which will be installed beside the trail.

Global Scholar Update



Many thanks to Rotary District 6780 and the Rotary Club of Knoxville for sponsoring my graduate degree at the University of Oxford this year! I am grateful for the opportunity to study at a global university among leading scholars in the field, all the while pursuing my passion for human rights and criminology. When I arrived in September, I attended the Rotary Scholars link weekend in Warwick. Around forty scholars from around the world attended, and all were studying in Great Britain and Ireland. Throughout the weekend

we visited Rotary GB&I headquarters, heard from a past scholar and current club president, and received tips about British culture and how to make the most of our experience as Global Scholars. It was a fantastic weekend!

So far, I have completed the first of three terms for the MSc in Criminology and Criminal Justice, called Michaelmas term. The course involves rigorous reading, studying, and participation in seminars and lectures. The department is outstanding, characterized by diversity for both faculty and students, providing a truly global academic experience! I also volunteered to help with the Border Criminologies Research Centre, helping with the blog. My hobbies at Oxford include learning to speak French and participating in the archery

club.

My host club, the Rotary Club of Oxford, and my counselor, Reverend Peter Ball, have provided a welcoming and enriching experience in Oxford. The members cultivate a warm community, support my studies, and encourage me to join club events. The club is the oldest in Oxford and meets weekly at the historic Randolph Hotel over lunch. During the meeting, members make a toast to the Queen and end with the toast 'Rotary and Peace the World over'. I had the opportunity to speak to the club on October 19 and also to the Easthampstead Rotary Club dinner on December 7, sharing my story.

The Rotary Club of Oxford hosts several community and fundraising events throughout the year. In November I volunteered with the club to host a party for senior citizens in the community. The day included a choir performance and a visit from the Lord Mayor of Oxford! I also joined the club for a fundraiser dinner for the Indian Club to celebrate the Diwali festival and a fundraising Christmas dinner at The Café from Crisis, which supports the homeless community in Oxford. I also joined the club for their annual Christmas lunch meeting!

Beyond Oxford activities, the Rotary Club coordinates with nearby hosts to provide interesting and enriching activities for the scholars. I went to the scholars induction meeting, a 'Meet the Scholars Event', a walking tour of Oxford, and a visit to Eaton and Windsor Castle. The tours were led by Rotary members of local clubs and provided opportunities for the scholars to meet each other and interact with Rotary members. There are a number of events planned for the spring as well. I'm looking forward to the next term and exciting events in the New Year!

Rotary License Plate Project for Tennessee



District 6780 has taken the lead in obtaining a Rotary International logo license plate in the State of Tennessee. Here is your opportunity as a Tennessee Rotarian to proudly display the Rotary logo on your license plate.

The State requires a minimum of 1,000 participants to initiate the program. The Department of Motor Vehicles charges \$35 for these specialty tags. The best part of this program is that half of these funds come back to The Rotary Foundation. Rotarians in all 4 Tennessee Districts are encouraged to participate.

Funds will be collected by District 6780 for the initial 1,000 applicants. The yearly renewal process will remain as for any specialty plate

registration. After the first 1,000 plates are issued, you may order a personalized Rotary plate but not before.

Once we have received the initial 1,000 applications, the District will submit all paperwork to the Department of Motor Vehicles. At that time the State will contact you for distribution of these tags. The mock-up of the plate still in draft form. Click [HERE](#) for the registration page in PDF format.
