Last Week' Program Access Oak Ridge Tracey Beckendor-Edo

Tracey Beckendor-Edo is Director of Teaching and Learning for the Oak Ridge Schools. A member of the Oak Ridge Breakfast Rotary Club, she is originally from Washington State and lived in Africa for 10 years. She has been in Oak Ridge since 2010.

As Director of Teaching and Learning, she is responsible for the digital technology program for the schools.

Although the school system has asked that all Oak Ridge students be supplied with a laptop computer, to date only Jefferson and

Youth Services Chair Margaretanne Ingle Public Relations Chair because the State of Tennessee said that by this year all student testing would be online. However, the State testing program crashed and the tests are still done with pencil and paper. It was decided to supply the middle school students because they are old enough to be familiar with electronic devices, and the grade-level classes are less mixed than in the high school.

Besides testing, why should students be supplied with computers? Oak Ridge Schools has a history of excellence and innovation in education, and, although the city's demographics have changed, the school system still has high academic standards. Using Blockbuster as an example of how technology changes, the speaker noted that the school system is trying to transform the educational experience, "trying to make sure our kids are ready for the future."

When asked why the computers should be supplied by the school system, she said that it's important that every computer have a single platform so teachers don't have to spend their time figuring out a lot of different devices. She also noted that many students come from home that simple can't afford to purchase a computer or provide internet access.

Beckendor-Edo made it clear that the equipment is not a "\$1000 pencil." Children are able to learn more with the computers.

Rotary Information Rotary Fellowships

Did you ever wonder how to connect with other Rotarians around the world who share your interest in a hobbie or profession? Rotary fellowships are groups of Rotarians, Rotarian spouses, and Rotaractrors who join together to

- share a common interest in worthwhile recreational activities (sports, hobbies, etc.);
- further their vocational development through acquaintance with others of the same profession;
- make new friends around the world;
- explore new opportunities for service; or
- have fun and enhance their experience in Rotary.

Examples of some Rotary fellowships are tennis, scuba diving, flying, or canoeing, but there are many others.

Each fellowship is operated independently of Rotary International, with its own rules, dues requirements, and administrative structure, and each fellowship elects at least three officers to oversee the group's administration.

Fellowships are expected to facilitate communication among their members and maintain regular communication with RI. Membership in fellowships is open to Rotarians, their spouses, and Rotaractors. Fellowships must be international in nature with active members in at least three countries.

Some of the benefits of being in a Rotary Fellowship are opportunities to form lasting friendships outside of the home club, district, or country and contribute to the advancement of world understanding and peace.
