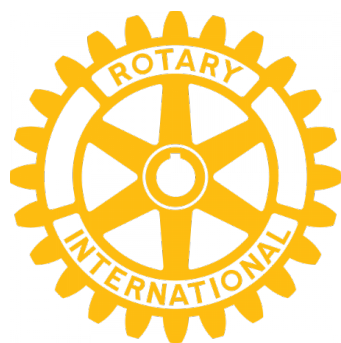

Last Week's Program

Transitioning from Cleanup to Reuse

Sherry Browder, Reindustrialization Manager, discussed how UCOR is transitioning from cleanup of the K-25 site to reuse as an industrial park. She began her talk with a brief history of the reindustrialization program since 1996 and how the program has transitioned from lease focus to transfer focus. She continued with a description of the three stages of this important project: ETPP cleanup, ETPP closure, and Heritage Center revitalization. The Heritage Center motto is, "Make it flat/Give it back!"

Currently Community Reuse Organization of East Tennessee (CROET) is developing sites as a blended, multi-use industrial park. The site has over 700 acres of land and 14 buildings to be transferred, which should support 200 private industry jobs with 22 companies. The transfer process takes at least 16 months. The K-31/K-33 large parcel transfer is imminent. Additionally, over 600 acres are currently in the transfer process.

Heritage Center has many economic development advantages to private industry. It has barge access, on-site rail, four-lane highway access, proximity to interstate highways, a highly skilled workforce, on-site fire department, cold water river intake, abundant electrical supply, ORNL partnerships, and a major university and strong community college network.

Ms Browder pointed out that the Manhattan Project National Historical Park legislation identifies the K-25 building footprint as being included in the National Park boundary. Historic preservation efforts are separate from the National Park effort, but could be incorporated in the the park. There will be a K-25 Virtual Museum, K-25 History Center,
