Last Week's Program

Russell Barker Anderson County Crime Taskforce Director



Our program last week was presented by Russell Barker, Director of the 7th Judicial Crime Task Force of Anderson County. Barker, a lifelong resident of Anderson County, began his law enforcement career as a police officer. In 2011 he was assigned to the Crime Task Force, where he served as a special agent investigating and prosecuting narcotics trafficking in Anderson County. He spoke about crime in Anderson County, especially drug-related crimes.

According to Barker, local users don't know how to use heroin safely, and overdosing is a

growing problem in Anderson County. The three opiate drugs most abused are crystal methamphetamine (ice), heroin, and prescription drugs (including fentanyl patches). "About 90% of the crimes in the county are related to drug use," Barker said. Anderson County used to be the number one meth lab county

in the state, but that has changed, and it is now about 15th. Thanks to increased law enforcement and new state laws restricting the sales of meth ingredients, the number of meth labs found in the county in one year shrank from 85 to 15.

Crystal meth is now being imported into Anderson County from Mexico and Central America. Heroin is transported to the county from Atlanta and Detroit. Law enforcement is now targeting drug dealers rather than addicts. Drug dealers in different cities tend to know each other. Oak Ridge was quiet last summer in terms of drug-related crimes because of a 32-county drug bust involving the Oak Ridge Police Department and many other law enforcement agencies.

When asked his opinion on legalizing marijuana in Tennessee, Barker stated positives and negatives. On the positive side, he cited the drug's benefit to those on chemotherapy and with PTSD. On the negative side, he explained how it is a gateway drug. In states that have legalized marijuana, social services have been strained with a great influx of homeless. In addition, dogs that are trained to detect drugs cannot differentiate between marijuana and other illegal drugs. It was also pointed out that there is no quick and easy test for marijuana like the breathalyzer test for alcohol.

Rotary Information How Rotary is Organized

Today more than 1.2 Rotarians belong to over 32,000 clubs in more than 200 countries and geographical areas. Rotary International is made up of 538 Districts and 34 Zones.

Rotary is a grassroots organization, with service efforts carried out by members of Rotary clubs. District and international leaders support Rotary clubs and help them provide service in their local communities and abroad.

Clubs

Rotarians are members of clubs, which belong to the global association Rotary International (RI). Each club elects its own officers and enjoys considerable autonomy within the framework of Rotary's constitution and bylaws.

Districts

Clubs are grouped into Districts, each led by a district governor. District leaders, including assistant governors and various committees, help guide and support clubs. Annual district conferences celebrate achievements and bring Rotarians from different clubs together. The Oak Ridge Sunset Rotary CLub is in District 6780, and the current District Governor is Fred Heitman, a member of the Rotary Club of Oak Ridge.

RI Board and Zones

The RI Board of Directors, which includes the RI President and president-elect, meets quarterly to establish policies. Directors are elected to represent Rotary clubs within a

particular zone (group of districts). The current RI President is John Germ, a member of the Rotary Club of Chattanooga. Our District is also represented on the RI Board by Karen Wentz, a member of the Rotary Club of Maryville-Alcoa.

The Rotary Foundation

The Rotary Foundation is overseen by its Board of Trustee, which includes the Trustee chaif and chair-elect. Trustees are appointed by the RI president, with approval from the RI Board.
