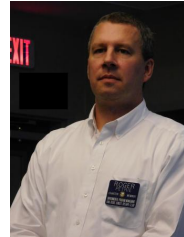

The Object of Rotary

Rotary's 100-year record of professionals joining together to use their skills and passion to make a difference in their communities is one that fosters pride in Rotarians worldwide. These values have been captured in various guiding principles (such as "Service above Self") and other statements over the years.

The object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

1. the development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;
2. high ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to service society;
3. the application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's persona, business, and community life; and
4. the advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

Core Values of Rotary

Rotary adopted the core values in 2007 as part of the Rotary Strategic Plan, understanding that these five values are fundamental traits of being a Rotarian.

Since their adoption the core values have been reaffirmed by the Board and are strongly supported by Rotarians throughout the world. Rotary International's core values are:

- Service
- Fellowship
- Diversity
- Integrity
- Leadership.

Africa Has No New Cases of Wild Polio Virus in Past Year

In July Nigeria marked its first year without a single case of paralysis caused by wild poliovirus. This remarkable success was bolstered by recent assessments of progress in Pakistan and Afghanistan, the only countries that have reported polio cases this year. This provides an opportunity to take a look at the state of polio eradication efforts in each of the three remaining endemic countries. New steps are being taken in all these countries to stop polio, but the goal can only be reached by sustaining momentum to ensure we reach all children with polio vaccines and continuing to improve surveillance.
