Last Week

Social Meeting followed by a report on the 2015 Dragon Boat Festival by Mark Watson

Members of all three Oak Ridge Rotary Clubs met immediately after our last meeting to hear Mark Watson, 2015 Festival Chair, report on the 2015 Dragon Boat Festival. According to Watson, there is a real concern about the costs, efforts and net financial benefit for the event. We netted about \$4000 this year after costs, but we recognize that some investments were made this year too.

In the meeting Watson reported on a few things we can do to reduce costs of future Dragon Boat Festivals, but the savings were relatively small compared to the overall expence of hosting the event. It seems that the only way to increase income from the event is to increase sponsorships.

In this year's festival there were 110 Rotary volunteers plus seven officials.

In the discussion that followed Watson's report it was pointed out that the two larger clubs had used the Dragon Boat Festival to replace their usual fundraisers, which generally netted about \$15,000 each year. The \$4,000 profit from this year's festival is to be split among the three clubs, pro rated based on membership. The Sunset Club gets about 15%.

Bob Kesling The Voice of the Vols

Our speaker on August 10 was U.T. sports announcer Bob Kesling. He explained that he was a walk-on freshman from Ohio when he joined the Vols football team, but he didn't get to play very much. Instead, he became a spotter for then announcer John Ward. When Ward retired 17 years ago, Kesling was offered the lead announcer position.

Kesling told several humorous stories about his time with the University of Tennessee and said that, "Calling games is the next best thing to playing!." He was pleased that when he called his first game for U.T. he got the score right and he got the commercials right. When he got home he asked if 15-year-old daughter what she thought of his performance, and her response was, "It didn't suck."

He talked about the 1985 football season in which Channel 10 television station had a contest called "I Beat the Best". The prize was two tickets to the Sugar Bowl. They drew the winning entry from a dumptruck full of entry cards, and the winner turned out to be an inmate at Brushy Mountain Prison. They had to draw again!

Kesling reported that he is happy to have been able to do so many different things in his career without having to move away from East Tennessee.
