
About Georgia Piedmont Technical College:

Speaker's Profile

Dr. Jabari Simama

Dr. Jabari Simama was appointed as Georgia Piedmont Technical College's President on September 1, 2012. He is the third President of the College to preside during its 51 years as a student-centered environment for lifelong learning and development.

Dr. Simama brought over 20 years of higher education experience at both two-year and four-year colleges and universities. Prior to this appointment, Dr. Simama held positions of increasing responsibilities at Atlanta Metropolitan State College, Clark Atlanta University, Georgia Institute of Technology (Georgia Tech), University of Cincinnati, Morgan State University, and Benedict College.

From 2005-2009, Dr. Jabari Simama served as Vice President for Community Development and External Relations at Benedict College in Columbia, S.C. He also, simultaneously, served as Executive Assistant to the college's president and chairman of a statewide consortium of technical colleges, universities, and state agencies desiring to interconnect via broadband. Associated with the consortium, he was instrumental in the South Carolina Technical College System's winning a \$3 million broadband grant from the U.S. Department of Commerce.

Dr. Simama earned his Ph.D. in American Studies from Emory University; his Master's from Atlanta University (now Clark Atlanta University), and his Bachelor's from the University of Bridgeport in Connecticut. He is the author of the highly acclaimed book: *From Civil Rights to Cyber Rights* (2009).

In addition to education, Dr. Simama has had extensive experience in government and the private sector. He was Deputy Chief Operating Officer and Chief of Staff in DeKalb County from 2009 to 2012; he was the Executive Director of Community Technology and Director of Marketing and Communications for the City of Atlanta from 1998 to 2005. He served as a member of the Atlanta City Council from 1987 to 1993. He also served as an appointed member of the Metropolitan Atlanta Olympic Games Authority, which provided financial oversight for the Atlanta Olympic Games Committee's \$2 billion budget. Further, he worked in the Cable TV industry prior to then.




Dr. Simama and his wife, Nisha, are the parents of two adult daughters.

Special Program – November 5, 2013

The Rotary Club of Stone Mountain Remembers our Veterans Lee Stuart, Lieutenant Colonel, United States Army (Retired)

Our speaker will be Lieutenant Colonel, US Army (Retried) Lee Stuart. His Veteran's Day address will be a reflection on the service of those that proudly wear the military





In 1996 Lee was shot at point blank range with a shotgun by three teenagers during an armed robbery attempt. His Black lab, Boomer, interceded and ran the robbers off when they attempted to shoot him a second time. Boomer was selected as the Army Aviation Heritage Foundation (AAHF) mascot of the year in 2002 and Animal Planet "Top Dog" for 2004 in Atlanta. Boomer passed away in 2006 and Lee penned his memoirs of Boomer in a recently released book titled: Boomer One of the Unwanted.

Lee served as a consultant for DOD and US State Department in Iraq from 2003 to December 2008. Lee was the Senior Operations/Executive Officer for USAID to get the five Northern Provinces of Iraq infrastructure back up in 2003-04. In September 2005 Lee/NAIMO was awarded a grant to teach the Kurdistan Ministry of Education how to incorporate Character Education into their educational curriculum and was awarded a second grant in September 2006 to work with the Iraqi Ministry of Education. Lee was invited to the White House in March of 2006 to receive the personal accolades of President Bush and First Lady Laura Bush for his humanitarian efforts in Iraq.

Upon his return to the United States in December 2008, Lee started the Warrior FAMILY program whose mission is to help America's finest and FAMILY members deal with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) - (www.warriorfamilyprogram.com).

Lee is the former Mayor of Stockbridge, Georgia for 2010-2013. Lee was chosen by the North Carolina Commission of Indian Affairs to represent his Sappony tribe as one of North Carolina's Veterans for American Indian Heritage month for November 2010.

Lee's son is a Special Forces Lieutenant Colonel, his oldest daughter is an Air Force Lieutenant Colonel-former Army Blackhawk pilot and his youngest daughter is a SWAT Officer with the Henry County Police Department. His wife Cheryl Lynn and he have 6 children and 17 grandchildren.

Georgia Hispanic Chamber of Commerce



First established in 1984 as the Atlanta Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, the Georgia Hispanic Chamber of Commerce (GHCC) has grown to become one of the largest Hispanic chambers of commerce in the nation with approximately 1,300 members. http://ghcc.org/articles/bro_mem.html The GHCC provides domestic and international programming and services, and serves as a voice on legislative initiatives impacting members' businesses at the local, state and federal levels. The GHCC is also home to the Georgia Hispanic Chamber of Commerce Business Development Center and the Georgia Hispanic Chamber of Commerce Political Action Committee.

Atlanta, the largest urban center in the southeastern U.S., has undergone profound social, cultural and demographic change since the 1980s. Prior to that time, the region contained two main ethnic groups: European Americans and African Americans. However, from 1980 to 1995, the Hispanic population of Georgia grew 130%. By 1996, there were 462,973 Hispanics in Georgia. From 1990 to 2000, Georgia became the third largest state for migrating Hispanics and

Latinos. The Hispanic population is the largest non-traditional minority group in the city. Hispanic Americans is the fastest growing ethnic group in Atlanta.

At 10.4% of the metro's population in 2010, versus only 6.5% in 2000, the metro's Hispanic population increased 103.6%, or 278,459 people, in ten years. Major Hispanic groups include 314,351 Mexicans, 43,337 Puerto Ricans and 17,648 Cubans. All of those groups' populations increased by over 90% in the ten-year period. Of the metro's 279,000-person increase in the Hispanic population from 2000 to 2010, 98,000 were in Gwinnett County; 37,000 in Cobb; 25,000 in Fulton (all but 3,000 outside the city of Atlanta); 20,000 in Hall; and 15,000 in DeKalb County. The Hispanic population is heavily concentrated in the northeastern section of the Atlanta metropolitan Area.

Hispanic Businesses

- According to *American Demographics*, with approximately 40% of all minority entrepreneurs being Hispanic, Hispanics make up the largest share of minority entrepreneurs.
- According to *Georgia Trend* magazine, with more than 13,000 firms, Georgia ranks 13th in the United States for the number of Hispanic owned business firms.
- According to the Center for Women's Research, the number of Hispanic women-owned firms grew by 39.3% between 1997 and 2002. Georgia ranks 6th in the list of states with the fastest growth rate in the number of minority women-owned firms.
- According to the *Atlanta Business Chronicle's Book of Lists*, 10 of Atlanta's top 25-minority owned firms are owned by Hispanics.

A Members Vocational Moment

Long Term Care Costs

Report from John Hancock

(Member's Vocational Moment – Submitted by Anresa Davis)

John Hancock Life Insurance Company (John Hancock) recently announced the results of its biennial long-term care (LTC) cost study, which found that LTC costs have continued to increase for all provider options.

The study, conducted by LifePlans Inc., based in Waltham, MA, surveyed approximately 16,000 long-term care providers, including nursing homes, assisted living facilities, and home health care agencies, in key cities across the country. Its findings revealed that the average annual cost of care in the U.S. is \$94,170 for a private room in a nursing home; \$82,855 for a semi-private room in a nursing home; \$41,124 for an assisted living facility and \$18,460 for adult day care. The average annual cost of care received at home was approximately \$29,640.

To understand how long-term care costs are trending over time, John Hancock calculated a five-year average based on a subset of common providers from our 2008 and 2011 Cost of Care Surveys and our 2011 and 2013 Cost of Care Surveys. These five-year average annual increases are summarized below:

- The 2013 average cost of a private nursing home room (\$258 a day/\$94,170 annually) has risen an average 3.6 percent per year
- The 2013 average cost of a semi-private nursing home room (\$227 a day/\$82,855 annually) has risen an average 3.6 percent per year
- The 2013 average cost for a month in an assisted living facility (\$3,427 a month/\$41,124 annually) has risen an average 2.0 percent per year
- The 2013 average cost of adult day care (\$71 a day/\$18,460 annually) has risen an average 1.6 percent per year
- The 2013 average cost for a home health aide (\$19 hourly/\$29,640 annually) has risen an average 1.3 percent per year(1)

Mission Statement






