Hope Rural School Dictionary Project

One of the areas that Rotary places great emphasis on is in the area of Literacy. Clubs are encouraged to read to young children, to help adults overcome illiteracy, and to donate books to those who cannot otherwise afford them.

On Friday, March 23rd, our Club held its annual dictionary, thesaurus and reading project at Hope Rural School, located in Indiantown. We have been supporting Hope Rural for many years and we are always warmly welcomed back. This year, we enjoyed record club volunteer participation and we want to thank Mac Skelly, Lee Gordon, Mary Rogan, Stan Collemer, John O'Neill, Nixon Lajoie, visiting Rotarian from San Juan Troy Fields, and (hopefully soon-to-be—newmember) Claudia Minervini.

Hope Rural is located approximately 30 miles from West Palm Beach. Migrant and immigrant farm workers have called it "home" for decades. Indiantown contains a diverse population of people including Mexico, Guatemala, and Haiti. In the late 1970s, a group of concerned citizens wanted to provide an opportunity for the education of migrant farm workers. Language and cultural differences caused these children great anxiety and made it hard for them to fit into the public school system as it existed at that time.

Hope Rural (continued)

Hope Rural was founded as a 501 (c) (3) to educate primarily, but not exclusively, the children of migrant and immigrant farm workers. The doors opened in August of 1980 and 30 children filled the one-room school with Grades K through 2.

Today, Hope Rural has expanded to include several pre-K classrooms (staring with the 3-year old "Little Hopes"), as well as Grades K through 5. From a one room school, Hope Rural currently exists as a seven building facility, which includes a cafeteria, auditorium, computer room, library, and offices.

Hope Rural incorporates all of this with an overall Catholic elementary education and nurtures the biblical principles of mercy, justice and love.

Our Club volunteers had the privilege of reading to two Pre-K classrooms, reading to a Kindergarten classroom, delivering dictionaries to all of the 4th grade students and delivering thesauruses to all of the 5th grade students.

We were *most heartened* when we entered the 5th grade class to hand out the thesauruses. We asked the class mates if they remembered us from last year. EVERY student reached into his/her desk and pulled out the dictionaries that we had given them last year!
